Amazingly the Guild has raised in one year £248,371.91 for the six projects running until 2015!!

Annually we have a discussion topic and this year it is "finding the right way". We look forward to everyone's contributions on that.

Guild Week is at the end of November each year and the Presbyterial Council of Ross marked the 10th Anniversary of its inauguration by taking a walk around Dingwall beginning at St Clements Church Hall and ending up at the coffee morning in Castle Street Church Hall. That day was our first taste of snow and winter. However all those who turned up enjoyed a really beautiful time together as we walked along the Canal path along by the Firth. Castle Street Church folk made us very welcome and had set up a table where all the Guild people could sit together and have even more time for fellowship. This was so kind and very much appreciated. In our own Guild, members took part in the morning service and were able to highlight the work of the Guild to the congregation.





The important event in our year at Ferintosh has been the Guild Link with Hamilton Bardrainey in Port Glasgow. We have had a couple of letters and have sent news from Ferintosh there. These are follow-ups to the visit by some of the ladies of their Guild to Conon Bridge in early summer. We look forward to strengthening this Link over the coming months and years.

The gift of God's message...

The opening verses of John's Gospel are invariably read at some point during Christmas and have become well known to us over the years. But when did we last take time to reflect on them and consider precisely what these verses are saying to us and in what way they are challenging us?

Read John 1:1-18

What are the main three things that this opening prologue to John's Gospel touches on?

- It tells us exactly who Jesus is.
 - o But who is Jesus to us what does He mean to us?
- It tells us of the relationship between Jesus and God.
 - Are we clear on this relationship and where do we fit into this?
- It hints that His mission will not meet with universal success.
 - Have we experienced this in our faith life and, if so, how have we dealt with this –
 what impact has it had on us?


What key themes are we introduced to in the verses, themes that will crop up again and again as we read through the Gospel?

- Eternal life- Instead of talking of the Kingdom of God
 - Why is John so focussed on this theme of Eternal life and is it different from the theme of The Kingdom of God we find in the Synoptic Gospels?
- The 'World'- used not only when speaking about the created order, but also used in a
 way to depict those who do not accept the revelation of Christ.
 - We often speak of 'worldly things'. Is there something of that in what John is saying here?
- Truth Jesus Himself not only reveals this truth, He is the personification of truth.
 - What do we understand by this Jesus being the personification of Truth?
- Dualism John's Gospel is full of dualistic pairs of opposites belief/unbelief, light/darkness, from below/from above
 - o But what are these all ultimately about?

Read through these verses again. What else can we learn from these opening verses?

- In a sense they are like a 'mini-gospel.
 - Verses 1-5 speak to us of the unity of Christ and God, a theme which we see throughout the fourth Gospel.
 - o Verses 6-8 introduce us to John the Baptist, sent to prepare the way for Christ.
 - Verses 9-13 speak to us of the coming of Christ into the world, the light of the world that not all would recognise.
 - Verses 14-18 speak to us of the incarnation and salvation, God becoming flesh and the salvation that this would bring those who accepted Him.

John's Gospel is unlike any of the other Gospels, of that there is no doubt and many believe it to be the most 'accurate' of all. His 'perspective' on Jesus Christ is unlike any of the other Gospels and in these opening verses we get a glimpse of why Jesus came and of what is to come, which is why it is such an important lesson for this time of year.



The **Ladies' Bible Study** meets fortnightly in the Church Hall at 2pm on Wednesdays. This year we are studying the Cover to Cover material on "The Ten Commandments - LIVING GOD'S WAY". So far we have looked at "who do you think I am" which examined the different titles we use when we speak and listen to God and how these names might affect our relationship with God - as a country, our church and ourselves.

We are now having a break until 7th January when we will follow ALTERnativity "Extending the Table - new meals for Advent and Epiphany". On the 7th it will be "Just Desserts"; a way of carrying the story of the birth into the New Year highlighting the arrival of the Wise Men thereby signalling that Jesus' birth was for all nations. It would be lovely if you could come along that day.

On 21st January, we will begin studying The Ten Commandments "Exclusive Rights". The ladies are friendly and welcoming and enjoy listening to others suggestions as well as joining in the discussion. Please give prayerful thought to joining us each fortnight.

Gifts to give freely...

The main local development in the last few months has been the **community choir**. Around 20 people have met every Wednesday evening in the hall to enjoy each other's company and sing a range of popular and seasonal music. So far the music has been for our own enjoyment, but in future, who knows... Anyone interested will be made very welcome when the choir meets again in the New Year. No need to read music or have any experience of singing in a choir. Enjoyment and enthusiasm are more important by far. Unfortunately a junior choir for 8-14 year olds did not prove popular, and has now ceased meeting.

In terms of world mission, there have been two recent events of note. Firstly, on Saturday 26th October 2013 the twinning agreement between the Presbytery of Ross and Ekwendeni Hospital in Malawi was signed by Rev. Fraser Stuart, the current Moderator of the Presbytery of Ross, and Mr Ron Gunstone, the Presbytery Clerk. The agreement had previously been signed in Malawi on behalf of the hospital. Ekwendeni Hospital was represented at the event in Castle Street Church hall by Maria Silo, who is Deputy Co-ordinator of the hospital's outreach programme to those living with HIV/AIDS (those infected, and those affected by the condition). Like many of the workers and volunteers on the outreach programme, Maria is herself living with the virus, and told us how she would probably have died but for the assistance of a group from a congregation in Cumbria who were on a visit to Malawi. This was in the days when regular anti-retroviral treatment was beyond the means of most Malawians, and certainly of a widow with a young family like Maria. Maria's candid insight into her life at that time was courageous and thought-provoking. The presentation she gave together with Marjorie Clark, Coordinator of the Church of Scotland's HIV/AIDS Programme, was totally inspiring. The difference which free treatment and targeted outreach work makes to individuals and families, but also to the country as a whole, is amazing. Educational work; campaigns to encourage testing; treatment, care and support of those infected, in their own homes where possible; support and self-help groups; practical help such as nutritious food, clothing and day care for young children of affected families, or school fees, clothing and materials for older children, or assistance to build or rebuild houses for families headed by children and older people. The list is endless, and this work is carried out in several hundred places around in the hospital's catchment area, by many hundred paid staff and volunteers. Best of all, statistics show that infection rates are reducing. Praise be to God!

The second event was a talk by Clapperton Mayuni, Director of the **National Bible Society of Malawi**, who came with a member of staff of the Scottish Bible Society. The two gentlemen gave a fascinating insight into the work of Bible Societies around the world, from translation to printing to distribution to engagement with the people of the country concerned. Clapperton has been involved in translation work, which is always undertaken by a group of people, some native speakers, others experts in the original texts. Sometimes it is necessary to develop a written form of a language before translation can begin. In Malawi, in spite of many years' work, the complete Bible exists in few of its several languages. In others, parts have been translated, and in others none at all. Historically Bibles for Malawi were printed in Scotland, more recently in South Africa, which reduced transport costs. Today the most cost effective option is to have them printed by the Amity Press in China. Clapperton told us that for an ordinary Malawian family the cost of a Bible is very high relative to their income, so it is a prized possession. The Society tries to keep the cost as low as possible, but must keep within its budget. He also showed an example of a low cost, wind-up player which can be used to bring the Bible to people whose level of literacy does not allow them to read it for themselves.

Bob and Jan Baxter will be attending the Guild meeting on the afternoon of February 3rd, when they will be able to give us first-hand information about the work of the **Raven Trust**, **the Viyele project** and other initiatives they have seen on their recent visit to Malawi. Anyone interested is welcome to attend, at 2pm in the Church hall.



It's easy to tell when it's Nativity Play time – I can never find a tea-towel!






A BIG THANK YOU
