It is so inspiring to hear and be part of the singing of approximately 2000 people from all over the country and from abroad.

The speakers in the morning were Rt Rev John P Chalmers, Moderator of the General Assembly and Rev Dr Margaret Fowler a parish minister in Jamaica. Both were so interesting. John spoke of his hope that, in a society in which so many are friendless and lonely, he will be able to encourage people to find faith, friendship and the Spirit of Christ in the community of the local church. Margaret is an expert on human trafficking and social justice. "We make life best, not by what we have but by what we give to the vulnerable."

Afternoon it was the turn of John Lowrie Morrison (Jolomo), a hugely popular landscape artist. He spoke about Christianity's relationship with art in the light of the 4th commandment. Throughout the day, Brightons Parish Church Praise Group sang to us and encouraged us to join with them. Very uplifting!



The Festival concluded with a Sunday evening Songs of Praise service. A fitting end to a weekend of friendship and worship.










Summer Fete

Bible Study - Daniel

Background Information:

Before the eventual fall of Jerusalem in 586 BC, King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon had already laid siege to the city and on at least two occasions, had taken captives with him back to Babylon. The early captives tended to be men of importance and influence within the city, along with some of the most beautiful women. The aim here was to demonstrate his dominance and also to deprive Jerusalem of some of its finest citizens. Daniel was among that first group of captives taken around 605 BC, the year in which Nebuchadnezzar came to power and swept through all of Palestine.

Daniel was born during the time of King Josiah and of the prophet Jeremiah, who between them did so much to try to turn the people back to God. Josiah, however was killed in battle against the Egyptians in 609BC and the prophet Jeremiah suffered under the people, who would not listen to him, choosing instead to return to their evil ways. Daniel was born into a noble family, hence the reason that he was taken captive, however, because of his background he, and three others, was given a course of instruction for service as scribes and officials in the royal court. Daniel himself is believed to have written this book around 536 BC and the book is essentially split into two parts. The first part, chapters 1-6, essentially deal with Daniel's life whilst the remainder of the book focuses on Daniel's visions.

Read Daniel 1

What can he learn from and about Daniel himself in this opening chapter?

- Despite his new surroundings and new position, Daniel refused to compromise his beliefs.
- There was little he could do about the new names they had been given, or the fact that they had been selected for this training, but they could remain true to God in what they ate?
- He showed great courage in taking this stand.
- He also showed great wisdom in the way he convinced the chief eunuch to accommodate his beliefs.
- Above all, however, he showed great faith and obedience to God

Read Daniel 2:14-49

What can we learn from Daniel's behaviour in these verses?

- Daniel was at a crisis point but did not shrink back in fear or dismay?
- Instead he prayed to God for guidance and inspiration, believing without doubt that God would answer.
- He immediately gives thanks to God for his answered prayer.
- In verse 24 we see him think of others as well as himself he could have used this knowledge to save only himself and his friends – but he interceded on behalf of others.



- He acknowledges before the King that it was God who gave him the vision giving God the glory and honour that was his. Because of this, the King himself later gave glory to God.
- He also acknowledged the role of his friends in all of this.

If we continue and read through the whole of Daniel, what do we learn?

- God is always in control.
- We need to persevere in our faith when we face difficult times.
- God can use us all, no matter our circumstances indeed God has a purpose for all
 of us.
- If we are obedient, loyal and faithful to God He will be more so to us.

CrossReach Focus

The story of CrossReach is a story of rebuilt relationships, of lives transformed to the extent that people in recovery are giving back through the Recovery Volunteers Training Programme. It's a story where people throughout Scotland are supported to unlock their potential, and make their own decisions personalised support. It's a story of challenge in a changing and demanding environment but one of resilience as the dedicated staff provide high quality support and award winning services. It's a story of successful partnerships and of funding which is enabling us to contribute to the improved health and wellbeing of people in Scotland. It's a story of celebration of the support provided not only by staff but by volunteers, who for the first time have been recognised in a Volunteer of the Year Award.

The Services to Older People

CrossReach has many years of experience in providing care and support to Older People in Christ's name. The staff work alongside people to develop a personal plan which enables each individual to live life the way they choose, with the appropriate level of support. This support is delivered in a variety of ways including residential care, dementia care, day care, respite care, community based care and support and also through creative arts.

Last summer saw a group of volunteers from Crown Church in Inverness help residents at Cameron House makeover their garden. The residents decided on the flowers and colour schemes choosing plants like mint and lavender, inspired by gardens they had created in previous years.



The **Ladies Bible Study** group meets every Wednesday in the autumn/winter months and began again on 17th September. We meet in the small Church Hall at 1.30pm for approximately an hour.

This is an informal meeting where we study the Word of God using various study guides to help. The relevant passages are read at home and consideration to some pertinent questions are thought about and then we bring our findings or thoughts or puzzlements to the group where we are able to talk about our studies and take note of each person's ideas and different slant on things. It makes for great fellowship and support.

We'd love to have more ladies join us. If you could manage just on the occasional time, that would be great too. Do give it your prayerful consideration.

Mission and Outreach Committee

The Chaplain of Ekwendeni Hospital, Rev Joshua Nyangulu paid a short visit to Ross Presbytery recently. On Thursday 11th September he spoke to representatives of the congregations in the Presbytery at a meeting in Roskeen Church. After giving an outline of the work of the hospital, he spoke of his work as chaplain, one of three full time hospital chaplains in the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian. Rev Nyangulu is responsible for morning devotions at the hospital – at 7.30am each day. On three mornings each week he leads the devotions in the area of the Outpatient Department where patients wait to be seen. On the other days a team of volunteers leads devotions on the different in-patient wards. Most of the rest of the chaplain's time is devoted to counselling both patients and staff members - at any time of the day or night! When he can, he goes out with the hospital's outreach teams to the surrounding villages, especially the HIV/AIDS team, but his schedule does not always allow him to travel at the same time as the teams, so he would welcome a vehicle, so that he could travel independently to the villages. The Presbytery World Mission Committee is looking into ways of assisting with this need. The Church of Scotland World Mission Council has recently donated an ambulance to the hospital, using money received in legacies.

Child Survival in Malawi (Scotland) Scottish Charity No. SC 035943

It was with great sadness that the trustees of this charity, at their meeting on 4th February this year, agreed to implement the winding up of the trust by 2015.

Four mains reason led them to this decision.

- The steady decline in donations since 2008. In 2013 donations just 49% of those in 2008. Fewer donors too.
- Some projects had ceased operating. Some have become independent; some no longer require the "seed donations"; others had administrative difficulties; no new projects were being identified.
- > Similar charities have grown up and making contact with congregations, schools and other non-governmental organisations in Malawi.
- > The Trustees are ageing and finding it difficult to maintain the high level of involvement required.

"Over the 21 years that it has existed, Child Survival in Malawi (Scotland) has never been a major player amongst those providing assistance to Malawi's orphans and vulnerable children, but we believe it has played a significant and responsible role in helping many of those in Malawi who have undertaken this crucial work.

Over the last ten years, £333,000 has been sent to 33 projects in Malawi. During that period, expenses were just 3.4% of our income.

We are proud of what we have been able to achieve and deeply grateful for the support which you have given through us to the projects we have been able to assist.

Please accept out thanks for all that you have done to make it possible."

Ferintosh Parish Church has been a long-time supporter of this charity, beginning with the children in Sunday School raising money to help children whose parents had died of AIDS and then spilling over into the congregation as a whole as the members saw this great need in Malawi.

On behalf of the charity, I thank you all for the support you have given over these many years.

Beach tales hit small screen

A minister's wife has seen the characters she dreamed up during beach walks turned into an animated television

'Lily's Driftwood Bay', about a girl who lives on an island, launched on top children's television channel Nick Junjor recently.

It was the culmination of a story that started seven years before for Joanne Carmichael, who lives in Lenzie with husband Reverend Dan Carmichael - the minister at Lenzie Union Church.

Inspiration came when the couple bought a bolt hole "not much bigger than a beach hut" on the Isle of Arran.

The mum-of-two said: "After months of filling my pockets with beach treasures, one day I sat on the sand and started to create first characters, and then trees, flowers, cakes, props and scenery from the beautiful wave-washed pottery, sea glass, driftwood and other more weird and wonderful beach finds.

"I plucked up the courage to sell them as pictures - first at Lenzie Primary PTA Craft Fayre and then Scottish Art Galleries."

But the characters were destined to break out from Joanne's pictures, with Belfast television company Sixteen South snapping up the idea and hiring some of the best-known voices in the business to bring them to life.

Joanne said: "I've watched as my idea of a wee girl Lily - who lived in a beach hut and who would rush down to the waves each day to see which new treasure had been washed ashore - has developed into Lily's Driftwood Bay with such amazing voices as Peter Mullan, Jane Horracks and Stephen Fry.

"I've been working with them and a talented team of over 100 people as Creative consultant over the last few years as they've developed it and brought it all to life.

"It's still very hard to believe it all started on Arran's beaches and Lenzie Primary PTA craft stall!"

And now Joanne is hoping to give something back to the island that inspired her-joining forces with the Community of Arran Seabed Trust (COAST) to campaign for cleaner beaches and seas around Arran.

She explained: "I have always regarded Arran's treasures washed ashore as a 'gift from the sea' for me as an artist, but I have been acutely aware all along that whilst to me the salvage is 'sea treasure,' for seabirds and marine life, they can prove to be deadly.

"I am delighted to be able to give something back to Arran, the beautiful Island where it all began."

Our Church's Finances

On Saturday, 13th September the Church held a Gift Day for its General Fund. In recent years the income from the annual Gift Days was required to meet some very substantial expenditures on the fabric of the Church through its separate Fabric Fund and as a consequence none of the money so generously given was attributed to the General Fund. The 2014 Gift Day letter explained how the General Fund had suffered as a result of this and as a result the Board had been required to sell some of the Church's investments.

To date a sum of £5,400 has been raised from the Gift Day for 2014 and the members of the Congregational Board thank all who contributed so generously.

In 2013 our expenditure exceeded our income in no less than nine of the twelve months and regrettably it looks as if similar deficits will arise in 2014.

During the past few years, the General Fund has ended the financial year in deficit. In 2013 the deficit amounted to £10,656 and this year 2014, despite the generous income from the Gift Day, it would appear that another deficit in the region of £6,000 will arise.

This unhappy situation can only be improved by either reducing our expenditure (which the Board is earnestly trying to do) and/or increasing our income. As our main source of income comes from the Congregational Offerings, the Board encourages all to consider reviewing their offerings and, if taxpayers, to sign a Gift Aid Declaration enabling the Church to claim an additional twenty five percent from HM Revenue and Customs, at no additional cost to the giver.
