#### Christian Aid Week 14 - 20 May 2017

This year the message for Christian Aid week 14 - 20 May was the plight of refugees, highlighting the trauma of Nejebar, her husband and two young sons, refugees in a Greek camp, who despite their extreme difficulties had the courage, and generosity to invite two, possibly orphaned brothers, to join their family unit.

With this message implanted in our hearts & minds we were inspired to give our time & talents in fund raising to help support the efforts of Christian Aid in their work to ease the suffering of those in need.

Thanks to the generosity of the congregations of Ferintosh, and Maryburgh (Free Church) the grand total from all fund raising efforts: Big Brekkie, door-to-door collections, book sale & music quiz, was a magnificient £2,184.57.

I would personally like to express my sincere gratitude to all who participated in fund raising this year, and hope more volunteers may come forward in 2018 to join in Christian Aid week.

The **Pastoral Care Team** continues to offer support and help to people in our community. It is small in size but it carries out an invaluable service to those who just need an extra bit of assistance.

Mainly it ensures people are able to attend clinics and appointments either locally in Dingwall or at Raigmore. Members also visit those who are unable to get about as before and also visit those no longer able to live at home but have moved into residential care.

Thanks go to those who have said they can help occasionally. If you'd like to volunteer, please contact the coordinator.



Not everyone can be a member of the team but everyone is asked to pray for the work of the team as it attempts to carry out the Lord's work.



Sadly this service provided by the **Highland** Foodbank is still required in our area. The foodbank is one of a Trussell Trust organisation run by Blythswood. Thousands of food parcels are given out each year and the need seems to be growing rather than diminishing. Perhaps you could help alleviate the distress caused by having no money for food and necessities. People come to foodbanks in the main because they have lost their job and are awaiting benefits. They tend not to be "scroungers" but truly desperate folk who just want to put food on the table.

We ask if you'd like to donate whatever you can in non-perishable goods by placing these into the basket in the annex of the Church. Tinned potatoes, tomatoes, corned beef, fruit, ham are really needed. So too are toiletries and baby needs. As you can imagine, if you can't afford food, you are unable to buy toothpaste, toilet rolls, baby wipes either.

Please do whatever you can to help.

CrossReach is the Social Care arm of the Church of Scotland. The mission statement reads like this, "In Christ's name we seek to retain and regain the highest quality of life which each individual is capable of experiencing at any given time."



They do this throughout the service where children, young adults, adults with learning difficulties, adults with mental health difficulties, people with addictions and older people are given help and support to fulfil this mission statement.

The current issue of CrossReach News contains articles concerning services local to us in Inverness. There is one about Beechwood House which provides residential rehabilitation for drug and alcohol misuse problems. There is another about a new initiative with Scottish Churches Housing Action together with Cale House helping people to navigate a path out of homelessness via a befriending scheme. Another article in the News is about Darren who has been a resident in Cale House who's now ready to take the next step into his own tenancy.

There are a few spare copies of CrossReach News at the back of the Church if you want to read more.

Peter Bailey retires as Chief Executive Officer with CrossReach after 25 years. Together with former Moderators, Very Rev. Dr. John Chalmers and Very Rev. Dr. Russell Barr they abseiled on Sunday  $28^{th}$  May from the Forth Bridge to raise money for the Children and Family services of CrossReach and raised the marvellous sum of £ 26,000 - double their target. We wish them all well in their retirement.

The new Chief Executive has been appointed and her name is Viv Dickenson who has worked for CrossReach for over 20 years. We wish God's blessing upon her in her new role.




We're inviting you to bake cakes for CrossReach. Not just any old cakes - cakes with a meaningful twist.

CrossReach would like you and your friends and family to bake cakes which are vibrant and full of colour but with their true splendour hidden by grey coverings.

#### Why Grey Cakes?

CrossReach Grey Cakes symbolise the world of someone who is affected by mental health problems, where the fog of anxiety and depression can feel overwhelming, colouring their experience of life. In Scotland, I in 4 adults or around 850,000 individuals experience mental health issues each and every year. Individuals who, assuming









#### Cupcake Recipe Makes Approximately 12 Cup Cakes

#### **Ingredients For Cakes**

100 g (4 oz) butter or margarine (or mix) 100 g (4 oz) caster sugar 2 medium eggs 100 g (4 oz) Self Raising Flour Gel food colouring in a mixture of colours\*

#### **Ingredients For Buttercream**

100 g (4oz) unsalted butter 200 g (8 oz) sieved icing sugar 4 tsp of hot water Vanilla Flavouring Black gel food colouring as required\* (This should make enough to cover 12-14 cakes)

#### Make The Cakes

#### Method:

- Pre-heat oven to 180°C, 350°F, Gas Mark 4. Line a 12 hole muffin tin with paper cases.
- 2 Cream butter/margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time, adding a little flour with each.
- 3 Gently fold in remaining flour.
  - To make a single coloured sponge add in a little of the food colouring and mix, keep adding and mixing until you get the desired colour.
  - To make rainbow sponge, divide the cake batter as evenly as you can into the desired amount of bowls and colour each one in turn before spooning into the paper cases.
- 4 Divide as evenly as you can into the paper cases and bake for 20-25 minutes.
- Cool in tin for 5 minutes before transferring to a wire rack to finish cooling.
- 6 Once cool, pipe or spread on grey buttercream icing

### Make The Buttercream And Decorate The Cooled Cakes

- 1 Cream butter gradually add icing sugar and cream/whisk together. Then whisk in the
- Add a few drops of vanilla flavouring/vanilla paste to taste
- Gradually add black food colouring until desired shade of grey is achieved
- Spread onto cooled cupcakes or place in a piping bag with a star nozzle and pipe on top of cupcakes.

\*Gel food colouring: this type of colouring holds better, requires less quantity to achieve the desired colour and doesn't affect the texture of the cake or icing as much as liquid.

It was a huge eye-opener to see the many varied activities which are carried out there - some to raise money (e.g. the shop in Dingwall High Street is supplied from here) and others to provide goods to people starting out from scratch in a new home.

Work experience is also available with the charity to get people into work. (e.g. carpentry, painting, upholstery, administration, bike repair, warehousing, retail, electrical, forklift, horticulture, first aid)

These are some of the things the charity does:

- furniture collection and house clearance
- upcycling (e.g. sofas, chairs, tables, bicycles)
- removals
- training



### **Book Review**

As we pack for summer holidays maybe we think of those books we have been desperate to read all year but only have time on holiday. One which is a must read is Fool's Talk by Os Guinness.

Contrary to what is sometimes stated, Guinness claims that people are not open, interested or needy for spiritual insight. More commonly they might take the position of Jung, Nitezshe and Sartre who all held that God is dead and therefore their truth claim is 'I am now out to be God of my own life'. In an individualistic society, people are inclined to claim the 'right to themselves' and the 'right to their view of things' rather than God's view of things. Guinness quotes Pascal who said, "when God addresses the human heart, there is always enough light for those who desire to see, yet enough obscurity for those who do not wish to see. What makes the difference is the heart."

This book is to help Christians develop the ability to speak to people who are closed to what we are saying, as Guinness believes that we are 'strikingly weak in persuasion'. Christians reading this can learn to help people appreciate the credibility of the gospel.



As I read it it helped me to think more clearly about the 'reason for the hope' that is within me and I continue to dip in and out of this book, having already read it through. I wholeheartedly recommend this book.
