I was reading a book published in the mid-seventies called hello its Monday again by John Jackson It started like this.

"Whatever the future may bring either of marvel or surprise at least we can all be assured of the need to make do with less. We have been told time and again that we are sailing into rough seas and struggle and sacrifice will be called for. Whilst I am sure that we will all get through this time of austerity relatively unscathed. Let us hope that any belt tightening applies to every part of society."

Remember this was written forty years ago yet it could well have been written yesterday when you look at all the newspaper headlines, cuts here, prices up their, inflation rates rising, interest rates low, cuts in the numbers of ministers and on and on there headlines go. John Jackson then goes on to say that over the years he has seen parents trying to teach their children something called manners. They tell their children there are two magic words called please and thank you and encourage them to use them in the right place. He goes on to recount how more and more adults seem devoid of manners.

Again this is probably as true if not more so today as in the past. Certainly this world would be a better place if people were better mannered. John states that there is no such thing as a bad mannered Christian. He pleads for an extravagance of doing something for nothing, doing it for no other reason than just the sheer joy of doing it. Not just do it yourself because it's cheaper, but doing something not for yourself, not for gain or for profit, but for free, for someone else. Service he argues means to a greater or lesser degree sacrifice on your part.

Maybe by visiting someone who is housebound or helping them attend hospital or doctor's appointments or just sitting with them. Good old fashioned manners and courtesy John argues should not be allowed to die. Jesus always treated people he met with respect. He taught on good manners. We overlook those words in the New Testament which say very simply that Jesus went about doing good.

Jesus was not always preaching
Jesus was not always praying
He was not always at worship in the house of God.
He was not always reciting the commandments.
But Jesus always went about with an extravagance in gentlemanliness
He was always extravagant in watching
Watching the lilies of the field
Watching the wheat
Watching the mustard seed and tree
Watching the birds of the air

Jesus was also always extravagant in stretching out a hand to those who were in any kind of need, the blind, the leper, the paralytic man, the woman whose past was less than perfect, those whom we would say live beyond the boundaries of normal society. What ever the future holds for the world or the country or the church let us always remember that Jesus was always extravagant in stretching out his hand to those in need. Therefore May we who follow in his footsteps do likewise.

Nominating Committee Update

It is now approaching 10 months since Rev'd Andrew Graham (and his wife Margaret) moved south to his new charge at Bendochy linked with Coupar Angus Abbey Church. Since then we have entered a period of vacancy. Quite a lot has happened during that time and at present the Nominating Committee are working hard to find a new minister.

At the time of writing, there are 5 churches with vacancies in Ross Presbytery, with a further 14 vacancies in the surrounding area of Caithness, Sutherland, Inverness and Moray. Clearly there is a lot of competition from other churches in the area, all of whom are also looking for a new minister. Hopefully, our position (near Inverness and Dingwall) plus the fact we are a single charge, have an active congregation and have a well looked after manse will work in our favour.

The vacancy process is specified by the Church of Scotland and to that end we need to follow their guidance. So far, the following areas have been tackled:

- Appointment of an Interim Moderator
- Permission to Call a new Minister has been given
- The Vacancy Schedule has been completed and confirmed by the Church of Scotland
- The Manse has been inspected by Presbytery
- The Parish Profile has been created and published on our website
- The Presbytery Advisory Committee has been appointed and has met with the Kirk Session
- The Electoral Register has been created and confirmed
- The Nominating Committee has been elected and is now at work

The work of the Nominating Committee is however confidential and therefore it may appear that "nothing" is happening. This concept of confidentiality cannot be over emphasised and indeed the Guidelines from the Church of Scotland for the Nominating Committee state quite clearly:

"It should be fully understood from the very beginning that the work of the Committee is confidential at all times. It should not be discussed with other members of the congregation or with others outside the congregation, including family members."

Consequently, members of the Kirk Session who are not on the Nominating Committee and even the Session Clerk are not being informed as to what is happening with the Nominating Committee and this is how it should be. Members of the congregation are asked to <u>not</u> embarrass any member of the Nominating Committee by asking for an update on progress as they clearly cannot provide one. If anyone has questions about the Vacancy Process at the present times, please talk to the Session Clerk who will do his best to provide reassurance.

Hopefully, in due course, the Nominating Committee will advise the Session and Congregation of a sole nomination and then it will be time to hear and then vote on the suitability of the sole nomination to become our new minister. In the meantime, we ask that you pray for the work of the Nominating Committee as they look for a new minister to lead our work here in Ferintosh.

By way of comparison, in our last vacancy it took 3 years to find a replacement minister for Rev. Daniel Carmichael before Rev'd Andrew Graham was appointed. Hopefully, our current vacancy will not last quite so long. Only time will tell...

A total of five members of Ferintosh Guild attended, as did a group from out Guildlink partners from Port Glasgow: Hamilton Bardrainney. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the occasion. Below is a selection of reflections on the day.

Ann writes:

On Saturday the second of September at the unearthly hour of 7am three intrepid travellers in the form of Janet Winchester, Margaret Mackinnon and Ann Smith set off from the heart of the Highlands travelling down the A9 to the Guild annual gathering at the Caird Hall, Dundee.

On arrival at 10am we were met by some lovely and caring stewards who showed us to our seats.

Treasured memories of the day included the tremendous singing of hymns and choruses by the massed voices, and of course the Moderator of the General Assembly who gave a keynote speech on love — and then he proceeded to try out a children's address on the Guild before his royal command performance at Crathie church. The choruses brought back happy memories of Sunday School days.

There was a break for lunch and then a swing band had Guild members dancing in the aisle!!! The final speaker of the day was Dr Pat Cairns who gave an interesting, informative emotional talk on the street children and their mums living in dreadful conditions in India, along with slavery and human trafficking. Three very happy and tired travellers returned home late, spirits uplifted by all the day's proceedings. All were in Church the following morning.



Janette writes:

Each time I attend the Gathering, I am struck by the friendliness of everyone: like-minded people coming together for a day of fellowship, worship and speakers. I'm sure the platform party are nervous but I felt this year was a particularly relaxed meeting, making it feel less formal than usual but also getting the messages to the delegates. Karen Gillon, assistant general secretary, was so natural and was able to diffuse difficult situations with well-timed humour.

Margaret writes:

A joyful, challenging and uplifting day spent with hundreds of guildswomen and a few men — a few young, some middle aged and many ever-young (even 103 years young) brothers and sisters in Christ. For me Dr Pam Cairns' talk was the most moving and soul searching part of the day. Trying to improve the lives of street children and victims of modern slavery is surely "going out in love". Dr Pam is a founding trustee of the charity "The Free to Live Trust" which is currently building a home for abandoned children of trafficked sex workers in Pune, India. Our praise following the address was most appropriate: "I the Lord of sea and sky".

Janet writes:

It was wonderful, immediately on entering the packed hall, to feel ourselves part of such an immense and powerful movement. Although the technology did not always co-operate, live exchanges with some of those participating by video link in many different parts of the country enhanced this feeling. That the two venues chosen were Kirk Yetholm, a village I often visited with my family when growing up in Borders, and Moray, where I lived as a teenager and later joined the Guild, made it very personal — that and the fact that I was sitting, singing and on occasion dancing alongside my school friend, now a Guild member in Aberdeenshire.

Irene sums the day up:

Scottish Northern Convention

We would like to invite you and your Church to participate in this year's Convention which runs from Sunday 24th to Thursday 28th of September in Castle Street Church of Scotland in Dingwall.

The speakers this year will be the Rev. David Johnston, minister of Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church, Bangor, Northern Ireland, who will be leading us in our morning Bible Readings, and the Rev. What is the Scottish Northern Convention?

The Scottish Northern Convention began in 1931 and apart from a short break during the years of the second World war has been held continuously ever since. This year therefore sees the 87th year of Convention Ministry in the Highlands. The Convention is modelled along the lines of its bigger sister convention in Keswick. The aim of the Convention remains that of deepening spiritual life.



Our Event

Organized by a committee composed of people drawn from across the reformed denominations within the Highlands, 'Scottish Northern Convention' lasts for five days during the month of September. It takes place in Castle Street Church in Dingwall.

The programme consists of morning Bible Readings, Evening Celebrations, a missionary lunch, and a church leaders' meeting. There will also be opportunities to fellowship over a cuppa, to engage with a number of missionary organisations at their stalls, and to browse through the bookstall provided by CLC Inverness. We also provide signing for the deaf on the Monday and Thursday evening services.

Viyele Elderly Feeding Programme: Harvest Appeal 2017

Letter from Bob & Jan Baxter

On our recent visit to Malawi in June, we had the opportunity to join in with the lunch at Viyele and share some hymn singing followed by prayer. As usual the members participated heartily and enjoyed their time of fellowship. After lunch we presented a cheque to the new chairperson, Rose, who was one of the founderorganisers of the project.

The presentation was enthusiastically(!) received and was followed by a very warm vote of thanks, accompanied by some lively African dance celebrations. We missed Margaret Cathcart's company for this, as when she'd attended with Bob the previous year she had joined in the dancing whole-heartedly to the wild delight of the gathering.



The group have again grown a field of maize (about an acre) to help with the programme; the work is done largely by volunteers – hoeing, planting, & harvesting. This is followed by stripping of the corn grains from the cobs, often a communal exercise with people sitting round a very large reed mat, accompanied by singing. This all involves many hours of labour. Some vegetables and potatoes are also grown in local gardens, and these activities help to defray the costs and make donations of money go further. It is good to be able to report good yields of maize this year, after the disastrous harvest in 2016. Prudent monitoring of prices enabled them to counter this to some extent by buying maize before the price sky-rocketed.

This year the numbers participating in the twice-weekly gathering have increased to about 28, including a very pleasant lady with mobility problems; she arrived in style, riding piggy-back on a cycle taxi! She had extremely good English and gave an impromptu second vote of thanks, which led to yet more singing.

On a rotation basis, each district of the parish is delegated with providing personnel for food preparation and cooking, which takes about one-and-a half hours. Health continues to be regularly monitored, and specialist help is arranged for those who give cause for concern. A 'doggy-bag' of food is provided for the 'go-gos' to help to feed their



dependant grandchildren. Others, too frail to attend the lunch meeting, are visited akin to 'meals-on-wheels'.

Of course, it has been a privilege for us to see this programme first-hand, and we would like to share the



appreciation, delight & thanks of the beneficiaries; the programme has undoubtedly enhanced the health and lifespan of many people since support for the project in began in 2005.

May we add our thanks for all the donations of money and blankets etc, and your prayerful support for this very important programme over the past year. They are a very real illustration of God's Love in Action.

THE HIGHLANDS SUPPORTS REFUGEES

On Saturday 12th August 'The Highlands Support Refugees' commandeered the Ferintosh Hall for an event with one aim in mind, creating friendships. As well as distributing aid to refugees throughout Europe and the Middle East, *The Highlands Support Refugees* provides practical support to refugee families resettled in the Highlands & Islands of Scotland.

Over the last 18 months Syrian families have been resettled in Alness, Kinlochleven, Forres, Orkney and the Western Isles. *The Highlands Support Refugees* planned this event to bring the families from all these areas together. The families arrived at Ferintosh hall at lunch time on the Saturday to tables laden with Syrian food and Syrian music playing. A whole host of volunteers (including some Ferintosh parishioners) brought and prepared food, kept the children entertained with outdoor games and art & craft activities and generally kept the day running. There was even a funny photo booth with fancy dress items for some silly photos! Luckily the rain held off just enough that the sports field next door could be used for football too.

Following on from the day time event at Ferintosh Hall, everyone moved on to a dinner at the Jami Mosque in Inverness. The families from the outer lying areas stayed with host families for the night, in and around Inverness. The next day was filled with a combination of bowling, soft play and shopping, before the families headed off home.

There must have been about 120 people altogether and the atmosphere was fantastic. The families were so pleased to meet other Syrian families and we have been informed that many are in regular contact with each other and some have met up again already! This was exactly the hope of the organisers from *The Highlands Support Refugees* when we thought up the event and we couldn't have done it without use of the hall. The Highlands Support Refugees collect donations of clothes, shoes & blankets from all over the Highlands & Islands, where volunteers sort and pack them at their depot in Sellar Place, Conon Bridge. We have sent aid to Calais, Dunkerque, Chios, Lebanon and Syria and as long as donations keep coming, we will keep sending it to those in need. Working together to care for others

CrossReach

This is the Social Work arm of the Church of Scotland and is highly regarded by all involved in this work throughout Scotland. As it says, care is given from the cradle to the grave. For now, CrossReach asks you to collect the old one pound coins and take them to the bank and send the proceeds to them. £40 pays for one hour of counselling for children whose parent(s) suffer from addictions.

CrossReach Week takes place this year from Sunday 24th – Friday 29th September and Rt Rev Dr Derek Browning, Moderator of the General Assembly wants to make mental health the main theme of his time with CrossReach and will visit services which offer perinatal mental health support, plus places which offer touching points with people such as drop-in centres. He helped launch the Grey Cake Bake at the General Assembly. Grey Cakes are grey on the outside but colourful on the inside, symbolising the ability and potential of everyone, even when covered by the grey fog of anxiety or depression.

The Crossreach Wall Calendar can be seen after the service on Sunday. This calendar has stunning views from around Scotland and is at a very reasonable price of £5. Great for sending off to friends and relations abroad (an Appointments Calendar with the same views is in the catalogue priced £4.50). A sheet for ordering is available. There is a Christmas Card and Calendar Collection brochure also available in the hall after Church service.

In July, the Guild visited the CrossReach Care Home, Cameron House, in Inverness, an amazing facility for those living with dementia. They receive such great care, helping them to lead lives to their potential.

Pastoral Care Team

The Team is there to help people most especially to attend appointments. However, we try to maintain contact with people in Care Homes and visits are made to various homes in the area. The Team very much appreciates the prayers of all who keep this work on their heart.

Ladies Bible Study

The meeting takes place weekly on a Wednesday in the small Church hall at 1.30pm for approximately one hour. We use various Bible Study notes to help us and this session we will begin by looking at the book of Daniel, one which was often quoted by Jesus himself. Cover to Cover study notes will be used, entitled "Daniel - Living Boldly for God". Subject areas covered are - Flourishing in a Hostile Culture; Risking all; First Pride, Then Crash; Extreme Courage in a Crisis; Cosmic Battle; God Goes to war for His People; When?

The ladies are friendly and welcoming. We read and study together and at home in preparation and then discussion takes place. However, you need not say anything if you'd rather just listen and absorb. We'd love to have you with us. First meeting on Wednesday 13th September. Do try to come along.

CALORIES: Tiny creatures that live in your wardrobe and sew your clothes a little bit tighter every night.




Learning together

Book Review - Everybody's Normal till You get to Know Them- John Ortberg

It seems ridiculous to take eight months to finish a book which is so uplifting, informative and encouraging. (I began it with relief after compulsory reading at college and only took it up again this summer before Scottish Church History would occupy me until Christmas.) But you know also when you find a treasure of a book you somehow don't want to get to the end because you know it will be hard to find one as good. This book has searching questions at the end of each chapter which could be good for a study group or for personal challenge.

Ortberg states 'God's ultimate desire for the world is 'shalom' the webbing together of God, humans and all creation in justice, fulfilment and delight'. He quotes' the natural condition of life for human beings is reciprocal rootedness' reminding us that we were not put on this earth to please or amuse ourselves.

Continuing this theme he stresses the need for us as Christians to reflect the close community of the Trinity, which he says is so important because God has been experiencing this community throughout eternity and this closeness should be the pattern for our lives - selflessly giving to the other.

So he claims this book is how imperfect people like you and me can pursue community with other imperfect people. This, he says is not a book for normal people to learn how to handle difficult people. It is not for normal people as there have not been any since the Fall.

His originality of thought shines through with his take on the woman who washed Jesus' feet with tears, contrasting with the loveless 'normal' Simon.

His chapter on heaven brilliantly concludes that 'I need to be changed so that I can rejoice in what heaven offers'. The sense of oneness that characterises the Trinity will finally be ours as well. Heaven is where he declares' we will all be normal at last!'

John Ortberg is also the author of 'If you want to walk on water, you've got to get out of the boat'. If anyone has a copy I would like to read it... but don't expect it back untill the New Year!
