


Touch of the Master's Hand

WHAT IS THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY?

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church of Scotland. The Assembly meets annually to hear reports from the councils and committees, make laws and set the agenda for the national Church. This year the General Assembly met from Saturday 18th - Friday 24th May.

The Assembly was first held in 1560, the year of the Scottish Reformation which marked the beginning of the Protestant Church of Scotland.

The Assembly takes place at the Assembly Hall in Edinburgh - the previous home of the Scottish Parliament from 1999 until 2005.

Many who attend or tune in online to the live worship, speeches and debates are profoundly touched by the strength and warmth of fellowship within the Kirk.

More than 730 commissioners from congregations across Scotland and more than 150 people from associated partners and other organisations came together to take part in debate, tradition and worship.

The Assembly was livestreamed - meaning you can watch it back on the Church of Scotland website.

Through providing training in tailoring, fashion design and chicken farming the Centre will improve the women's skills in marketing and entrepreneurship. The aim is that the women's socio-economic status is improved and their chances of future employment increase. By selling the produce made at the Centre the plan is that when the funding finishes the project will be self-sustainable – able to continue to improve the lives of women in Malawi.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK



This year's Christian Aid week in May succeeded in raising over £1,900.00 thanks to the generosity of the church congregation, and communities of Conon Bridge, Maryburgh and the wider area. Many thanks to all who helped - the stalwart door to door collectors, supermarket volunteers, those who helped in so many ways with the soup lunch and the prayers of those who gave support.

This magnificent sum will help Christian Aid and their partners improve facilities for mothers and their babies in Sierra Leone and beyond, enabling the "Gift of Life" to be enjoyed by those less fortunate than ourselves.

We are living in a world of change, not least where the act of giving is proving more difficult - quite simply collections in cash are just one of the 'hurdles' we will have to overcome in order to be in a position to support this and other charities. Next year, we in Conon Bridge, may have to consider different methods of raising money to support Christian Aid week.

HIGHLAND FOOD BANK

Sadly, the use of foodbanks is still very much in evidence and shows no sign of diminishing. In Inverness, demand for the foodbank's services have increased by 20%.

At Ferintosh, we have been very generous throughout the whole year in providing non-perishable foodstuffs, toiletries, cleaning materials and – at special times of the year – little extras to make life a bit more bearable for those who are down on their luck. HELPING HANDS

In 2015 Highland Hospice created the Helping Hands befriending service as a way of benefitting people within their own communities.



Helping Hands is a volunteer befriending and support service delivered by Highland Hospice throughout Easter Ross, the Black Isle and Inverness. Volunteers regularly visit people in their own homes, providing social and practical support in an informal way to people with ongoing health concerns which limit their ability to socialise and get out and about.

The service is open to all individuals in need, regardless of their diagnosis.

Helping Hands volunteers may offer companionship, help with practical tasks such as shopping, provide emotional support at times of change or difficulty, accompany their client to appointments or a social group or offer respite for the carer to enable them to have time for themselves. Core to the success of the service is the real connections made between the clients and the volunteers. Helping Hands is now integrated into the local community and has been positively evaluated by the clients, carers, referrers and volunteers.

It is important to recognise that Highland Hospice does not just support people at the end of life, and this service offers support for people at various stages of their ill-health journey. The earlier people receive support, the greater their benefits will be from having a befriender.

Highland Hospice is keen to spread the message about the benefits of befriending, and Helping Hands has a very active Facebook page with short video clips from clients, carers and their befrienders.

Volunteers are always needed to implement the service well in Ross-Shire. To volunteer all you need are a couple of hours ever week or fortnight and the desire to help somebody in this rewarding role. HIGHS AND LOWS

Isaiah 57:15.

"For this is what the high and lofty One says, he who lives forever, whose name is holy: "I live in a high and holy place, but also with him who is contrite and lowly in spirit, to revive the spirit of the lowly and to revive the heart of the contrite."

The phrase, 'the high and lofty heavens' is really emphasising the great distance between God and us. And this distance is brought out in three ways in this text.


First of all, there is a physical gap and that is brought before us really in the first phrase "He is the high and lofty one." And then later on it says, "I dwell in the high place."

Why is Isaiah bringing this emphasis, highlighting this 'distance' to his hearers in Israel? Well, it is because Israel were under great threat. They were being besieged by the Assyrians and they were really on the verge of being overwhelmed.

But instead of turning to the Lord their God, they were turning to everything else and trying every other option. They were turning to foreign kings and nations as this chapter makes clear. They were returning to Egypt and especially the Egyptian army. They were also turning to idols again as this chapter brings before us and especially idols that were on tops of mountains.

The idea was that if they could find the highest mountain and worship on top of the highest mountain, then that would get them closer to 'a god' and maybe get them some help. Some of them were even worshipping the stars and the planets.

In essence, they were turning to the highest powers and the highest kings and the highest nations, the



And that is why Isaiah comes in and says that there is one far higher. There is one higher than the highest earthly king or nation. There is one higher than the highest mountain. There is one higher than the highest planets or stars...

Isaiah is saying basically all these high things that you are looking to in this world, whether they be kings or nations or mountains or idols or plants or stars, they are just nothing. They are just little pieces of dust compared to the great high and lofty One... the One true and living God.

Well, if there's a distance gap, **secondly** there is a time gap that Isaiah brings before the people. Notice he says it is the high and lofty One who "lives forever". In other words, Isaiah is conveying very clearly that God lives in the ever present NOW! This can be a very hard concept for us to get our heads around simply because we can't go back in time and we can't go forward in time either. And that is because we inhabit time. We live in moments. We live in seconds. We live in one particular spot in the whole timeline of history.

But God is so different because He inhabits eternity. What does that mean?

It means that God inhabits every single point of time all of the time. If we were to look at the whole timeline of history, then the first second of it is as present to God as our time right now!

God is in every single second, every single moment of time, every month, every year, every day, every



But instead of turning to the Lord their God, they were turning to everything else and trying every other option. century and every millennium are all as present to God as this moment is to us right now.

It's mind boggling isn't it? We can't even begin to imagine what that must be like or what God must be like when He inhabits and dwells in eternity.

But there is a **third** gap here and it is a moral gap, a moral distance. We are told that God inhabits eternity and His name is holy. The next phrase says that God lives in the high and holy place.

Now when we read about names in the Old Testament, we need to remember that a name actually means character. When we read of a name it is usually describing a character and this verse here is saying that God's Name is holy which means His character is holy!

Everything about Him is holy. His love is holy. His justice is holy. His wisdom is holy. His power is holy. His everything about him is holy, his whole character is holy! God does holy things. He speaks holy words. He lives in a holy place. Therefore His name describes that He is Holy!

So why is Isaiah bringing these great gaps to Israel, the distance gap, the time gap, the moral gap? It is because Israel had such a low and poor view of God.

The vast majority of Israelites had shrunk God down so that God wasn't even just one of them on their level, but they had even reduced God to something less, almost forgotten and insignificant.

And Isaiah is reminding those who were treating God as just some little thing, that their view of God was all wrong. Isaiah brought these great gaps to the people's attention to enable them to conceive of the Lord far more accurately, more realistically, and so that they may again be in awe of this AWESOME God.

Don't we need this today? Our generation needs it, but all of us need it. We all have an ability to shrink God in our thinking. We live in a day where God is diminished in society and where He becomes an irrelevance in our everyday. We need to be reminded

again and again by God's Word of the greatness and the awesomeness of God so that we might begin to see him as he really is, that we might no longer treat him irreverently and insignificantly, but begin to be awed and humbled before Him.

But Isaiah doesn't want to allow people to think that this God who dwells in the high and lofty heavens is unreachable. He wants them to call on God, he wants them to turn again to this AWESOME God!! And that is why Isaiah brings our attention to the fact that this awesome God desires to dwell with His people.

There is a contrast here. There is this high and lofty heaven where God dwells, but He also desires to dwell 'with him who is contrite and lowly in spirit.'

That word 'contrite' means crushed or turned to dust. And the word 'humble' means lowly, reduced, or brought down.

What kind of person does Isaiah have in mind when he writes here? This obviously isn't the strong and the mighty and the wise and the successful and those that are self confident, and self assured.

This is another kind of person altogether. These are people who have been crushed and broken by life. These are people who have been crushed by their moral weakness, crushed by their personal foolishness, and crushed by their spiritual coldness.

But what does God do for them? He doesn't just visit. He does something when He visits "to revive the spirit of the lowly and to revive the heart of the contrite."

The Lord comes into that broken life and HE starts the spiritual rebuilding. He starts renovating. He starts replacing the brokenness. He comes to heal and forgive as He alone bridges the distance gaps to rescue us from our sins and to give us eternal life.

How can we know this awesome God? How can we know His life-giving power and forgiveness? We look to God's only begotten Son, the Lord Jesus Christ who died and rose again so that we could know the life-giving power of the love of God to reach us, rescue us, and keep us for all eternity.


PANCAKE PIZZAZ

At the other end of the hall Pauline was ready with the face paints, Lorna with the craft materials. Roderick, Martin, Lara, Anya and Isla had set up a range of indoor games for the younger visitors.

In between we had set up tables with 48 places – but soon had to fit in another, and quickly clear used crockery as more and more guests arrived.

In the small hall everything was ready for Mhairi's presentation at 3 o'clock.

The doors opened and it was as though someone had pressed a switch. Very soon all was activity and sound: orders taken and filled; items bought and sold; faces painted; Easter eggs, chickens and bunnies decorated; skittles bowled, basket balls thrown through hoops (or not); squeals of delight as lucky dip parcels were opened; and over and around all the buzz of conversation – as guests of all ages from Conon, Maryburgh and all around enjoyed our Pancake Pizzaz.

It was almost a bonus that the money raised eventually totalled £720 for the **Heal Nepal** appeal of The Leprosy Mission. In the earthquake which hit that land in 2015 the Mission's hospital in Anadaban was badly damaged. Initially staff, whose houses had been destroyed, had to live in temporary accommodation while continuing to treat not only the patients they already had, suffering from leprosy or its consequences, but also the many casualties of the earthquake. Some of the leprosy-affected patients who were well enough actually gave up their beds to the new arrivals and slept on the floors. The Leprosy Mission launched the Heal Nepal appeal to raise funds to repair and extend the hospital, and the UK government pledged to match all funds raised between January and April 2019, up to a maximum of £2million. In the end, the appeal raised almost £1.7million, giving the Mission around £3.4million towards the work, which is already in hand.

As this is my last week as Probationer in Training for Ordained Local Ministry at Ferintosh, several people have asked what would I be expecting to do next.

I hope to be ordained sometime in the summer in Ferintosh Parish Church and this has been a great pleasure to have trained here among you all; but my role does not continue here.

As a part time and unpaid post, an Ordained Local Minister is not inducted to a charge as would a full time National minister but is ordained into a role within Presbytery. I have felt called to be more and more involved within the Care Home sector and with those in vulnerable groups and Presbytery has agreed to ordain me as Chaplain to Vulnerable groups on an interim basis subject to Presbytery Plan. With that in mind I plan to be spending time in other churches exploring how this will work out.

Within Presbytery I would also be available to help out with funerals and pulpit supply - including administering the sacraments.

I am sure of God's guidance just as he has guided me this far and I know that I will have the love and prayers of this congregation for which I am thankful.

This text is especially meaningful to me and is for us all: 2 Timothy 1:9 "He has saved us and called us to a holy life - not because of anything we have done but because of his own purpose and grace. This grace was given us in Christ Jesus before the beginning of time."



The conclusion of Irene's training was celebrated by the congregation of Ferintosh with the presentation of a cake, bible and flowers after a morning service, followed by lunch with some of the Kirk Session.
